# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT Reporting to Public Session on Tuesay, March 30, 2021

## 1. Action Against Racism

On June 23, 2020, the Board of Education passed a motion designed to engage with, listen to, and learn from the Burnaby community—in particular, Black, Indigenous and People of Colour (BIPOC).

The motion stated that the district engage in broader continers with Black, Indigenous and racialized communities to inform a district anti-ism action plan and update anti-racism policies. A key component of the motion outlining the Board's commitment to meaningful engagement and moving anti-ism work forward in the district, was the development of a district AntiRacism Ad Hoc Working Group.

This working group, including students, parents, teachers, support staff, administrators, school and districtored staff, and trustees, has been working tirelesslyther past few months. The group came together to offer their insight and expertise in supporting the development of an engagement process that would allow for broader community conversations including meaningful, safe and culturally sensitive opporturities students, staff and families.

The Anti-Racism Working Group met regularly from November 2020arch 2021. They began by establishing core values for their collective work and collaborated to define a commitment statement to introduce an autism engagement process for consideration for the district's community.

This evening, Roberto BombelliAssistant Superintendenwill share the proposed engagement process on behalf of the Anticism Working Group, including recommendation for the process and its implementation.

## 2. Planning for September

Throughout the 20201 school year, school districts have been following the Ministry of Education's 5-Stage Return to School Plan, managing and mitigating the risks of GOVID 19 in schools.

The Ministry of Education's 5 –

support essential service workers; supporting vulnerable students who may need special assistance; and providing contityui of educational opportunity for all students.

Since September 2020, schools have been operating in Stage 2 of government's Return to School Plan. Stage 2 clearly defines specified cohort and learning group sizes, as well as density targets and, as a utes school districts have offered a variety of piers on and remote program options.

While there remains uncertainty regarding the pandemic and implications for schools in the months ahead, it is anticipated that schools will return to Stage 1 of tister) WisrK — 12 Education Plan in September 2021. This would see all students, Kindergartante—12, attend schools in person, full time.

This evening, Assistant Superintendents Jeannette Laursoo and Wanda Mitchell will share some key takeawaysom this school year and plans for elementary and secondary school schedules for September 2021.
